Robert J. Brown is a hazardous materials specialist with the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, Western Service Center in San Francisco, CA. He has held this position for the last 14 years and is currently responsible for providing education and technical assistance to field staff, as well as industry, on safe transportation of hazardous materials. He is an associate staff instructor for the RSPA Transportation Safety Institute in Oklahoma City and the FMCSA National training Center in Arlington, Va., a project manager for the Hazardous Materials Packaging Inspection Program (HMPIP) software development project, and the national coordinator for FMCSA's national HM Shipper Check since 1988.

Brown received his bachelor's degree from the Government Seton Hall University and his graduate degree from the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College.

Sharon P. N. Cravalho is a safety investigator for the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA), Hawai'i Division. She is responsible for conducting compliance reviews of motor carriers and shippers of hazardous materials, evaluates their safety practices and compliance with the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations, Hazardous Materials Regulations, Commercial Drivers License Regulations and other laws and regulations affecting commercial motor carriers. She has also participated in outreach programs and speaking engagements, providing education and technical assistance to the state's partners and various motor carrier groups.

Cravalho received her Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of Hawai'i. She also attended the Western Washington State University and the University of Dijon, France.

Wendy L.B. Cunningham has served in the Federal Service for over 18 years. She currently serves as the Division Administrator with the US-DOT Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, Hawai'i Division Office. She has responsibility for the State of Hawai'i and the U.S. Territories of Guam, American Samoa and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands. She holds a Bachelors of Arts Degree in Accounting from Huntingdon College, Montgomery, Ala. Her career has taken her to many assignments throughout the United States including Alabama, Tennessee, Michigan, Florida, South Carolina, and now Hawai'i.

As a division administrator, Cunningham is responsible for administering a comprehensive surface transportation safety, compliance, and enforcement program in the state and territories. Some

of the various programs include commercial driver's licensure, hazardous materials, motor coach operations, and motor carrier investigations. Her duties also include the administrative development and oversight of state enforcement and grant programs that include: commercial driver's licensure, inspections, accident investigations and intelligent transportation systems (ITS) involving commercial motor vehicles.

Steve Guderian is a regional program manager for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), Region 9, San Francisco office. He has been with NHTSA since October 2001. His responsibilities as regional program manager include the areas of occupant protection, law enforcement, police traffic services, alcohol and aggressive driving.

Guderian received his Bachelors of Science Degree in physics with a minor degree in mathematics from California State University at San Bernardino. He currently resides with his wife in Martinez, Ca.



Dr. David Manning has served as the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) Region IX Administrator since February 1999. Region IX has responsibility for the states of Arizona, California, Hawai'i and Nevada, as well as the territories of American Samoa, Guam and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

In 1996, Manning was chosen as one of the 10 members of a national team to travel to Australia and New Zealand to conduct an international audit of the safety programs of these two countries.

Manning has his undergraduate degree in Economics from the University of Missouri. He received his Masters degree in Urban Affairs and his Doctorate in Urban Education from the University of Wisconsin. He is a retired Major from the United States Air Force and lives in Concord, Ca.

David B. Martin is the field administrator for the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA), Western Service Center, Denver, Colo. Prior to coming to Denver, Martin was the division administrator of the Texas division. Martin came to Texas from Atlanta, Georgia, where he was an enforcement team leader. He served in the US Air Force from 1967 to 1971.

Since joining the FMCSA, Martin has served as a safety investigator in Missouri and Iowa. In 1983,

he was promoted to Officer-in-Charge of Alaska. He was also the Officer-in-Charge in Delaware from 1985 to 1987.

In addition, Martin has served as the regional director in Region 6 until the reorganization in 1999 of Federal Highway Administration. He has also served from 1987 until 1993 in the regional office of Atlanta, Ga., as the federal and state's programs manager and the regional program coordinator.

Milt Schmidt has served in a variety of positions with the U.S. Department of Transportation for over 24 years. His current position as International NAFTA Coordinator includes responsibilities on U.S./Canada border issues, commercial vehicle safety issues, and intelligent transportation systems issues. Additionally, he has primary field responsibilities for the development and implementation of the Commercial Vehicle Safety Information Systems (CVISN) in the Eastern U.S.

Schmidt has a Master's Degree from the State University of New York in Public Administration and a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science from the University of Wisconsin.

Paul B. Snodgrass is the Alcohol/Drug Impaired Driving Coordinator, Senior Program Manager, and Legislation Coordinator for the NHTSA Region 9 office in San Francisco. Snodgrass has served with NHTSA since 1978, and has been the impaired driving coordinator since 1985. He has helped to plan, facilitate and present at impaired driving conferences and training courses for police, prosecutors and judges in Arizona, California, Hawai'i and Nevada and at the National Judicial College, University of Nevada, Reno. He has testified on impaired driving and traffic safety legislation in the Arizona, California and Nevada Legislatures. He has taught at MADD legislative conferences in California, Hawai'i, Nevada and Texas. Most recently he was appointed to serve on the NHTSA national Integrated Planning Team to plan for national and state impaired driving strategies for the next ten years.

Snodgrass received his B.A. *Magna Cum Laude* in 1976 in Mass Communications and Political Science. He was on active duty in the U.S. Navy from 1967 through 1971 and received a Vietnam Service Medal with three stars.
